Service Snapshot

H.I.R.E. provided services to

1,160

people through employment assistance, mentorship and community building activities.

Direct Service

157 people received employment assistance through Jobs Not Jails and

Our Transforming Integration into Meaningful Experiences (T.I.M.E.) lived experience mentorship program provided 1:1 mentorship to 9 individuals incarcerated in the juvenile justice system - 2 of whom were released!

26 people were connected with health benefits & food delivery and 16 people attended Peer Support Groups

Community Building

The Reentry Resource Fair serviced 589 attendees and our Youth & Family

Fair serviced 173 youth and families

We hosted **5 subcommittee meetings** with **96** total participants focusing on Youth Reentry & Reentry Employment






Gender Identity





Programs

Jobs Not Jails

Our Jobs Not Jails program remains a vital bridge for individuals seeking stability and opportunity after incarceration. In 2024, 91% of clients sought employment, while 47% requested housing support and 38% needed assistance accessing food—underscoring the complex challenges faced by our community.

Despite lacking full-time staff dedicated to this program, and operating with the support of dedicated volunteers and interns, Jobs Not Jails delivered life-changing results. Through weekly case management, therapy, and targeted employment readiness and job placement support, 71% of participants were placed into quality employment, earning an average of \$20.15 per hour—equivalent to \$41,915 annually. Having a quality job enables a person to provide for themselves and their families, afford housing, and stay out of the system.

H.I.R.E. was proud to partner with the County of Orange to host a **Fair Chance Hiring** workshop and job fair. The workshop focused on educating county contractors about the value of fair chance hiring and the benefits of engaging skilled talent. The accompanying job fair connected employers to second chance hiring opportunities with justice-involved job seekers, offering attendees direct support, employment leads, and meaningful opportunities to reenter the workforce.

This program exemplifies our commitment to holistic reentry support and the incredible outcomes that arise when community and compassion come together.





Client Success

Staying the Course

After serving 20 years in prison, Matthew was released in 2021 and found himself in a tough situation. The dog training program he was working at had recently downsized, leaving him without a job and with no way to support his family. Matthew applied for many jobs, but due to his conviction history, he was turned away after not passing their background checks.

During his time at the dog training program, Matthew met one of H.I.R.E.'s T.I.M.E. mentors who recommended him to H.I.R.E. for help after his employer downsized. **Matthew hoped to find stable employment, build a resume, and make valuable business connections.**

When Matthew applied for help through our Jobs Not Jails program, he initially felt nervous, but that quickly gave way to a sense of security. Matthew appreciated knowing that there are resources available for people like him, and it was comforting to know that someone cared and would follow up with him.

H.I.R.E. helped Matthew create his first professional resume, provided career advice and assisted him with job applications. In Matthew's words, the people he worked with considered his whole situation and were "really cool".

After just a few weeks, Matthew became employed full time with a H.I.R.E. partner organization, as a Peer Navigator. He truly enjoys his job and is living happily with his family. He is also pursuing his passion for dogs and is running a dog boarding business out of his house which he hopes to expand to offer dog training as well. Matthew continues to work with, and stay in contact with H.I.R.E. for support on his journey.

T.I.M.E. Programs

T.I.M.E. Mentorship

In 2024, H.I.R.E.'s Transforming Integration into Meaningful Experiences (T.I.M.E.) Mentorship program supported nine justice-involved youth with the guidance of six dedicated mentors with lived experience. Ranging in age from 17 to 42, these mentees are all involved in the juvenile justice system and are provided with critical support, guidance and reentry planning. Services were provided across juvenile hall, county jail, and state prison settings. Mentors maintained consistent, individualized support, resulting in significant milestones: two mentees were found suitable for release, with two others awaiting decisions in 2025. One long-term mentee, incarcerated since 2001, is now being reviewed for potential release through the juvenile system, with continued support from H.I.R.E.



T.I.M.E. Volunteering

The T.I.M.E. Volunteering program piloted in late 2023 to help clients gain work experience and give back to the community. Though limited capacity prevented full rollout in 2024, one successful event with Paws for Life allowed three clients to contribute meaningfully. The program is currently on hold, pending dedicated staffing to ensure sustainability and engagement.





Reentry Resource Fair

3rd Annual Reentry Resource Fair

Our 2024 Reentry Resource Fair, held at the Honda Center in May, was **our largest and most impactful event to date**. Drawing an incredible **588 attendees** and featuring **63 community vendors**, the fair expanded its reach this year by welcoming not only people impacted by the justice system, but also members of the homeless and recovery communities.

To enhance the event, we offered on-site services including resume reviews, professional headshots, food boxes, dental exams, and haircuts—all of which were met with overwhelmingly positive feedback. This event served as a powerful reminder of what's possible when we bring together resources, support, and opportunity under one roof to help individuals on their path to reentry and stability.

Youth & Family Fair

3rd Annual Youth & Family Fair

In partnership with Project Youth OC, our 2024 Youth & Family Resource Fair reflected our commitment to supporting young people and their families with tools for success, connection and wellness.

Thanks to generous **sponsorship from CalOptima**, the vibrant and engaging event provided job linkages and resources for **173 disconnected youth and their families** in addition to valuable on-site services such as free dental exams, haircuts, and giveaways like backpacks filled with school supplies, gift cards, toys and food, helping families access essential care in a welcoming and supportive environment.

Fueling Our Mission


2024 marked a turning point for H.I.R.E.—a year of financial growth, stability, and new opportunities.

Significant milestones include:


- We fully transitioned from fiscal sponsorship with Charitable Ventures on March 16, 2024
- Increased revenue 254% over the prior year, ending the year with a budget surplus setting us up for a fully funded 2025 for the first time in our history.
- In partnership with the County of Orange and Griffin/Swinerton, H.I.R.E. began developing Orange County's first ever workforce reentry training facility (est. 2028) – unlocking new funding relationships, helping us strengthen and scale our impact.
- Planning for our first physical facility (est. summer 2025) which will enhance our ability to serve clients.

As we look ahead, we remain focused on sustainable growth, intentional partnerships, and expanding the reach of our programs to rebuild lives and strengthen communities.

Supporting Successful Reentry


In California, roughly 65-70% of people return to incarceration within three years of their release. This is costly and ineffective.

Orange County alone releases around 55,000 people back to our communities each year in need of services and support.

Having a quality full-time job drastically reduces recidivism and saves tax-payers millions of dollars each year.

To help keep up with the need in the community, H.I.R.E. launched our Barriers to the Boardroom campaign in 2024, helping to lead people from the numerous barriers they have after incarceration to be future community leaders.

eghan Medlin's career reflects a profound commitment to community service and transformative leadership. With over 15 years of nonprofit leadership experience, she founded Medlin Workforce & Reentry Solutions (MWRS) in 2019 and the Hub for Integration, Reentry & Employment (HJRE) in 2020. Under her leadership, HJRE. has made a significant impact, assisting over 123 individuals in its inaugural year in 2021 and now serving over 700 people annually. MWRS has also thrived, earning recognition as the emerging Woman-Owned Business of the Year in 2021 in 2024, Medlin is leading an initiative to integrate HJRE. and MWRS under one roof, creating a comprehensive "one-stop shop" for reentry and workforce development services in Orange County. Her participation in initiatives like the Stepping Up Initiative, OC Cares, Continuum of Care Board, SB 823, Ban the Box and numerous others highlights Medlin's comprehensive approach to community betterment.

Looking Ahead...

Common Good on the Horizon

In 2024, H.I.R.E., in partnership with Griffin/Swinerton and Medlin Workforce & Reentry Solutions, was honored to be selected by the County of Orange to develop and operate *Common Good*—the county's first-ever Workforce Reentry Training Facility, scheduled to open in 2028 at the site of the old animal shelter in Orange. This just under five acre visionary center will serve as a comprehensive hub for individuals returning from incarceration, combining job training/placement, transitional housing, behavioral health services, mentorship, comprehensive holistic services, and retail operations on one property. It represents a bold step forward in building equitable pathways for people impacted by the justice system.

The need is clear: Orange County releases over 50,000 individuals annually from local jails alone, the majority of whom return to communities with little access to coordinated services. With soaring housing costs, limited employment options for those with records, and the persistent stigma of incarceration, reentry remains one of the most pressing and overlooked equity issues of our time.

To meet this need sooner, thanks to OC Cares, we are also **opening our first physical facility in Summer 2025**—an interim space that will provide immediate access to essential services while we prepare for the long-term vision of *Common Good*. This space will allow us to scale our programming, support more clients, and deepen our partnerships across the county.

This milestone marks a turning point not just for H.I.R.E., but for our entire community. **We believe that** when people are supported with dignity and opportunity, cycles of incarceration can be broken—for good.

We invite you to be a part of this movement. Whether through partnership, advocacy, or a financial gift, your support helps create the infrastructure needed for long-term change. Together, we can build a future where every person returning home has the chance to thrive.
